


# UNVENTED (VENT-FREE) GAS LOG HEATER OWNER'S OPERATION AND INSTALLATION MANUAL

▲ WARNING: If the information in this manual is not followed exactly, a fire or explosion may result causing property damage, personal injury or loss of life.

- Do not store or use gasoline or other flammable vapors and liquids in the vicinity of this or any other appliance.
- WHAT TO DO IF YOU SMELL GAS
  - Do not try to light any appliance.
  - Do not touch any electrical switch; do not use any phone in your building.
  - Immediately call your gas supplier from a neighbor's phone. Follow the gas supplier's instructions.
  - If you cannot reach your gas supplier, call the fire department.
- Installation and service must be performed by a qualified installer, service agency or the gas supplier.

INSTALLER: Leave this manual with the appliance. CONSUMER: Retain this manual for future reference.

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### **SAFETY**

WARNING: Improper installation, adjustment, alteration, service or maintenance can cause injury or property damage. Refer to this manual for correct installation and operational procedures. For assistance or additional information consult a qualified installer, service agency or the gas supplier.

A WARNING: This appliance is for installation only in a solid-fuel burning masonry or UL127 factory-built fireplace or in a listed ventless firebox enclosure. It is design-certified for these installations in accordance with ANSI Z21.11.2. Exception: Do not install this appliance in a factory-built fireplace that includes instructions stating it has not been tested or should not be used with unvented gas logs.

WARNING: This is an unvented gas-fired heater. It uses air (oxygen) from the room in which it is installed. Provisions for adequate combustion and ventilation air must be provided. Refer to Air for Combustion and Ventilation section on page 6 of this manual.

This appliance may be installed in an aftermarket,\* permanently located, manufactured (mobile) home, where not prohibited by local codes.

This appliance is only for use with the type of gas indicated on the rating plate. This appliance is not convertible for use with other gases.

### SAFETY

Continued

WARNING: This product contains and/or generates chemicals known to the state of California to cause cancer or birth defects or other reproductive harm.

IMPORTANT: Read this owner's manual carefully and completely before trying to assemble, operate or service this fireplace. Improper use of this fireplace can cause serious injury or death from burns, fire, explosion, electrical shock and carbon monoxide poisoning.

A DANGER: Carbon monoxide poisoning may lead to death!

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning: Early signs of carbon monoxide poisoning resemble the flu, with headaches, dizziness or nausea. If you have these signs, the fireplace may not be working properly. Get fresh air at once! Have fireplace serviced. Some people are more affected by carbon monoxide than others. These include pregnant women, people with heart or lung disease or anemia, those under the influence of alcohol and those at high altitudes.

Natural and Propane/LP gases are odorless. An odor-making agent is added to these gases. The odor helps you detect a gas leak. However, the odor added to the gas can fade. Gas may be present even though no odor exists. Make certain you read and understand all warnings. Keep this manual for reference. It is your guide to safe and proper operation of this fireplace.

WARNING: Any change to this heater or its controls can be dangerous.

WARNING: Do not use a blower insert, heat exchanger insert or other accessory not approved for use with this heater.

WARNING: Do not allow fans to blow directly into the fireplace. Avoid any drafts that alter burner flame patterns. Ceiling fans can create drafts that alter burner flame patterns. Altered burner patterns can cause sooting.

Due to high temperatures, the appliance should be located out of traffic and away from furniture and draperies.

Do not place clothing or other flammable material on or near the appliance. Never place any objects on the heater.

Heater base assembly becomes very hot when running heater. Keep children and adults away from hot surface to avoid burns or clothing ignition. Heater will remain hot for a time after shutdown. Allow surface to cool before touching.

Carefully supervise young children when they are in the room with heater. When using the handheld remote accessory, keep selector switch in the OFF position to prevent children from turning on burners with remote.

You must operate this heater with the fireplace screen and hood in place. Make sure fireplace screen and hood are in place before running heater.

Keep the appliance area clear and free from combustible materials, gasoline and other flammable vapors and liquids.

### **SAFETY**

#### Continued

- This appliance is only for use with the type of gas indicated on the rating plate. This appliance is not convertible for use with other gases.
- Do not place propane/LP supply tank(s) inside any structure. Locate propane/LP supply tank(s) outdoors (propane/LP units only).
- 3. If you smell gas
  - · shut off gas supply
  - · do not try to light any appliance
  - do not touch any electrical switch; do not use any phone in your building
  - immediately call your gas supplier from a neighbor's phone. Follow the gas supplier's instructions
  - if you cannot reach your gas supplier, call the fire department
- 4. This heater shall not be installed in a bedroom or bathroom, unless installed as a vented appliance. See <u>Installing Damper Clamp Accessory for Vented Operation</u>, page 12. This gas log set may not be installed as a vented appliance in a bedroom or bathroom in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- 5. Before installing in a solid fuel burning fireplace, the chimney flue and firebox must be cleaned of soot, creosote, ashes and loose paint by a qualified chimney cleaner. Creosote will ignite if highly heated. A dirty chimney flue may create and distribute soot within the house. Inspect chimney flue for damage. If damaged, repair flue and firebox before operating heater.
- Do not burn solid-fuel in a masonry or UL127 factory-built fireplace in which a vent-free room heater is installed.
- If fireplace has glass doors, never operate this heater with glass doors closed. If you operate heater with doors closed, heat buildup inside fireplace will cause glass to burst. Make sure there are no obstructions across openings of fireplace.
- 8. To prevent the creation of soot, follow the instructions in *Cleaning and Maintenance*, page 26.

- Before using furniture polish, wax, carpet cleaner or similar products, turn heater off. If heated, the vapors from these products may create a white powder residue within burner box or on adjacent walls and furniture.
- 10. This heater needs fresh, outside air ventilation to run properly. This heater has an Oxygen Depletion Sensing (ODS) safety shutoff system. The ODS shuts down the heater if enough fresh air is not available. See <u>Air for Combustion and Ventilation</u>, page 6. If heater keeps shutting off, see <u>Troubleshooting</u>, page 28.
- 11. Do not run heater
  - where flammable liquids or vapors are used or stored
  - · under dusty conditions
- 12. Do not use this heater to cook food or burn paper or other objects.
- 13. Do not use heater if any part has been exposed to or under water. Immediately call a qualified service technician to inspect the room heater and to replace any part of the control system and any gas control which has been under water.
- Do not operate heater if any log is broken.
   Do not operate heater if a log is chipped (dime-sized or larger).
- 15. Turn heater off and let cool before servicing, installing or repairing. Make sure the selector switch is in the OFF position. Only a qualified service person should install, service or repair heater.
- 16. Make sure the selector switch is in the OFF position when you are away from home for long periods of time.
- 17. Remote-ready heaters must not be connected to any external electrical source.
- 18. Operating heater above elevations of 4,500 feet may cause pilot outage.
- 19. To prevent performance problems, do not use propane/LP fuel tank of less than 100 lb. capacity (propane/LP units only).
- Provide adequate clearances around air openings.




Figure 1 - Product Identification

### **LOCAL CODES**

Install and use heater with care. Follow all local codes. In the absence of local codes, use the latest edition of *The National Fuel Gas Code*, *ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54\**.

National Fire Protection Association, Inc. Batterymarch Park Quincy, MA 02269 **State of Massachusetts:** The installation must be made by a licensed plumber or gas fitter in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Sellers of unvented propane or natural gas-fired supplemental room heaters shall provide to each purchaser a copy of 527 CMR 30 upon sale of the unit.

Vent-free gas products are prohibited for bedroom and bathroom installation in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

# OPTIONAL REMOTE CONTROL ACCESSORIES

There are four optional remote controls that can be purchased separately for Remote-Ready Models Only:

- wall switch
- hand-held ON/OFF remote
- wall thermostat
- · hand-held thermostat remote

See Accessories, page 37.

The wall thermostat or hand-held thermostat may not be used where vented decorative listing is required.

### UNPACKING

A CAUTION: Do not remove the data plates from the grate assembly. The data plates contain important warranty and safety information.

 Remove logs and heater base assembly from carton.

Note: Do not pick up heater base assembly by burners. This could damage heater. Always handle base assembly by grate.

- 2. Remove all protective packaging applied to logs and heater for shipment.
- Check all items for any shipping damage. If damaged, promptly inform dealer where you bought heater.

### **PRODUCT FEATURES**

#### **OPERATION**

This heater is clean burning. It requires no outside venting. There is no heat loss out a vent or up a chimney. Heat is generated by both realistic flames and glowing coals. This heater is designed for vent-free operation with flue damper closed. It has been tested and approved to ANSI Z21.11.2 standard for unvented heaters. State and local codes in some areas prohibit the use of vent-free heaters. This heater may also be operated as a vented decorative (ANSI Z21.60) product by opening the flue damper.

### SAFETY DEVICE

This heater has a pilot with an Oxygen Depletion Sensing (ODS) safety shutoff system. The ODS/pilot is a required feature for vent-free room heaters. The ODS/pilot shuts off the heater if there is not enough fresh air.

### **ELECTRONIC IGNITION SYSTEM**

This heater has an electronic ignitor to light heater fuel supply.

### AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION

WARNING: This heater shall not be installed in a confined space or unusually tight construction unless provisions are provided for adequate combustion and ventilation air. Read the following instructions to insure proper fresh air for this and other fuel-burning appliances in your home.

Today's homes are built more energy efficient than ever. New materials, increased insulation and new construction methods help reduce heat loss in homes. Home owners weather strip and caulk around windows and doors to keep the cold air out and the warm air in. During heating months, home owners want their homes as airtight as possible.

While it is good to make your home energy efficient, your home needs to breathe. Fresh air must enter your home. All fuel-burning appliances need fresh air for proper combustion and ventilation.

Exhaust fans, fireplaces, clothes dryers and fuel burning appliances draw air from the house to operate. You must provide adequate fresh air for these appliances. This will insure proper venting of vented fuel-burning appliances.

# PROVIDING ADEQUATE VENTILATION

The following are excerpts from National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, Air for Combustion and Ventilation.

All spaces in homes fall into one of the three following ventilation classifications:

- 1. Unusually Tight Construction
- 2. Unconfined Space
- 3. Confined Space

The information on pages 6 through 8 will help you classify your space and provide adequate ventilation.

### **Unusually Tight Construction**

The air that leaks around doors and windows may provide enough fresh air for combustion and ventilation. However, in buildings of unusually tight construction, you must provide additional fresh air.

Unusually tight construction is defined as construction where:

- walls and ceilings exposed to the outside atmosphere have a continuous water vapor retarder with a rating of one perm (6 x 10-11 kg per pa-sec-m²) or less with openings gasketed or sealed and
- b. weather stripping has been added on openable windows and doors and
- c. caulking or sealants are applied to areas such as joints around window and door frames, between sole plates and floors, between wall-ceiling joints, between wall panels, at penetrations for plumbing, electrical and gas lines and at other openings.

If your home meets all of the three criteria above, you must provide additional fresh air. See <u>Ventilation Air From Outdoors</u>, page 8.

If your home does not meet all of the three criteria above, proceed to <u>Determining Fresh-Air Flow For Heater Location</u>, page 7.

### Continued

### **Confined and Unconfined Space**

The National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/ NFPA 54 defines a confined space as a space whose volume is less than 50 cubic feet per 1,000 Btu per hour (4.8 m³ per kw) of the aggregate input rating of all appliances installed in that space and an unconfined space as a space whose volume is not less than 50 cubic feet per 1,000 Btu per hour (4.8 m³ per kw) of the aggregate input rating of all appliances installed in that space. Rooms communicating directly with the space in which the appliances are installed\*, through openings not furnished with doors, are considered a part of the unconfined space.

\* Adjoining rooms are communicating only if there are doorless passageways or ventilation grills between them.

# DETERMINING FRESH-AIR FLOW FOR HEATER LOCATION

### Determining if You Have a Confined or Unconfined Space

Use this work sheet to determine if you have a confined or unconfined space.

**Space:** Includes the room in which you will install fireplace plus any adjoining rooms with doorless passageways or ventilation grills between the rooms.

1.	Determine the volume of the space (length
	x width x height).

Length x Width x Height = \_\_\_\_cu. ft. (volume of space)

Example: Space size 20 ft. (length) x 16 ft. (width) x 8 ft. (ceiling height) = 2560 cu. ft. (volume of space)

If additional ventilation to adjoining room is supplied with grills or openings, add the volume of these rooms to the total volume of the space.

Multiply the space volume by 20 to determine the maximum Btu/Hr the space can support.

\_\_\_\_\_ (volume of space) x 20 = (Maximum Btu/Hr the space can support)

Example: 2560 cu. ft. (volume of space) x 20 = 51,200 (maximum Btu/Hr the space can support)

3. Add the Btu/Hr of all fuel burning appliances in the space

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Vent-free fireplace	Btu/Hr
Gas water heater*	Btu/Hr
Gas furnace	Btu/Hr
Vented gas heater	Btu/Hr
Gas fireplace logs	Btu/Hr

Other gas appliances\* + \_\_\_\_\_ Btu/Hr
Total = \_\_\_\_\_ Btu/Hr

\* Do not include direct-vent gas appliances. Direct-vent draws combustion air from the outdoors and vents to the outdoors.

### Example:

 Compare the maximum Btu/Hr the space can support with the actual amount of Btu/Hr used.

\_\_\_\_\_Btu/Hr (max. the space can support)
\_\_\_\_\_Btu/Hr (actual amount of Btu/Hr used)

Example: 51,200 Btu/Hr (maximum the space can support)

73,000 Btu/Hr (actual amount of Btu/Hr used)

The space in the above example is a confined space because the actual Btu/Hr used is more than the maximum Btu/Hr the space can support. You must provide additional fresh air. Your options are as follows:

- A. Rework worksheet, adding the space of an adjoining room. If the extra space provides an unconfined space, remove door to adjoining room or add ventilation grills between rooms. See <u>Ventilation Air From Inside</u> <u>Building</u>, page 8.
- B. Vent room directly to the outdoors. See <u>Ventilation Air From Outdoors</u>, page 8.
- C. Install a lower Btu/Hr fireplace, if lower Btu/Hr size makes room unconfined.

If the actual Btu/Hr used is less than the maximum Btu/Hr the space can support, the space is an unconfined space. You will need no additional fresh air ventilation.

WARNING: If the area in which the heater may be operated is smaller than that defined as an unconfined space or if the building is of unusually tight construction, provide adequate combustion and ventilation air by one of the methods described in the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, Air for Combustion and Ventilation, or applicable local codes.

### AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION

### **VENTILATION AIR**

### Ventilation Air From Inside Building




Figure 2 - Ventilation Air from Inside Building

This fresh air would come from an adjoining unconfined space. When ventilating to an adjoining unconfined space, you must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of the ceiling and one within 12" of the floor on the wall connecting the two spaces (see options 1 and 2, Figure 2). You can also remove door into adjoining room (see option 3, Figure 2). Follow the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, Air for Combustion and Ventilation for required size of ventilation grills or ducts.

### **Ventilation Air From Outdoors**

Provide extra fresh air by using ventilation grills or ducts. You must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of the ceiling and one within 12" of the floor. Connect these items directly to the outdoors or spaces open to the outdoors. These spaces include attics and crawl spaces. Follow the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, Air for Combustion and Ventilation for required size of ventilation grills or ducts.

*IMPORTANT:* Do not provide openings for inlet or outlet air into attic if attic has a thermostat-controlled power vent. Heated air entering the attic will activate the power vent.




Figure 3 - Ventilation Air from Outdoors

### INSTALLATION

NOTICE: This heater is intended for use as supplemental heat. Use this heater along with your primary heating system. Do not install this heater as your primary heat source. If you have a central heating system, you may run system's circulating blower while using heater. This will help circulate the heat throughout the house. In the event of a power outage, you can use this heater as your primary heat source.

WARNING: A qualified service person must install heater. Follow all local codes.

NOTICE: State or local codes may only allow operation of this appliance in a vented configuration. Check your state or local codes.

WARNING: Make sure the selector switch is in the OFF position before installing heater.

WARNING: Seal any fresh air vents or ash clean-out doors located on floor or wall of fireplace. If not, drafting may cause pilot outage or sooting. Use a heat-resistant sealant. Do not seal chimney flue damper.

WARNING: Before installing in a solid fuel burning fireplace, the chimney flue and firebox must be cleaned of soot, creosote, ashes and loose paint by a qualified chimney cleaner. Creosote will ignite if highly heated. A dirty chimney flue may create and distribute soot within the house. Inspect chimney and firebox flue for damage. If damaged, repair flue and firebox before operating heater.

# WARNING: Never install the heater

- in a bedroom or bathroom unless installed as a vented appliance, see page 12
- · in a recreational vehicle
- where curtains, furniture, clothing or other flammable objects are less than 36" from front, 42" from top of heater; for side clearances see Figure 4, page 10
- · in high traffic areas
- in windy or drafty areas

CAUTION: This heater creates warm air currents. These currents move heat to wall surfaces next to heater. Installing heater next to vinyl or cloth wall coverings or operating heater where impurities (such as, but not limited to, to-bacco smoke, aromatic candles, cleaning fluids, oil or kerosene lamps, etc.) in the air exist, may discolor walls or cause odors.

IMPORTANT: Vent-free heaters add moisture to the air. Although this is beneficial, installing heater in rooms without enough ventilation air may cause mildew to form from too much moisture. See <u>Air for Combustion and Ventilation</u>, page 6.

### **CHECK GAS TYPE**

Use the correct type of gas (natural or propane/ LP). If your gas supply is not the correct gas type, do not install heater. Call dealer where you bought heater for proper type heater.

WARNING: This appliance is equipped for either natural gas or propane/LP gas but not both. Gas type is indicated on the rating plate. Field conversion is not permitted.

# INSTALLATION AND CLEARANCES FOR VENT-FREE OPERATION

WARNING: Maintain the minimum clearances. If you can, provide greater clearances from floor, ceiling and adjoining wall.

Carefully follow the instructions below. This will ensure safe installation into a masonry, UL127-listed manufactured fireplace or listed vent-free firebox.

# Minimum Clearances For Side Combustible Material, Side Wall and Ceiling

A. Clearances from the side of the fireplace cabinet to any combustible material and wall should follow diagram in Figure 4, page 10.


Example: The face of a mantel, bookshelf, etc. is made of combustible material and protrudes 3 ½" from the wall. This combustible material must be 4" from the side of the fireplace cabinet (see Figure 4, page 10).

### Continued

Note: When installing your gas logs into a manufactured firebox, follow firebox manufacturer's instructions for minimum clearances to combustible materials.

B. Clearances from the top of the fireplace opening to the ceiling should not be less than 42".

NOTICE: Manual control heaters may be used as a vented product. If so, you must always run heater with chimney flue damper open. If running heater with damper open, noncombustible material above fireplace opening is not needed. Go to *Installing Damper Clamp Accessory for Vented Operation*, page 12.

# Minimum Noncombustible Material Clearances

### If Not Using Mantel

Note: If using a mantel proceed to <u>If Using Mantel</u>. If not using a mantel, follow these instructions.




Figure 5 - Heat Resistant Material (Slate, Marble, Tile, etc.) Above Fireplace

You must have noncombustible material(s) above the fireplace opening. Noncombustible materials (such as slate, marble, tile, etc.) must be at least 1/2" thick. With sheet metal, you must have noncombustible material behind it. Noncombustible material must extend at least 8" up (for all models). If noncombustible material is less than 12", you must install the fireplace hood accessory (24" and 30" Models Only). See Figure 5 for minimum clearances.

### If Using Mantel




Figure 6 - Minimum Mantel Clearances Without Using Hood




Figure 7 - Minimum Mantel Clearances When Using Hood

You must have noncombustible material(s) above the fireplace opening. Noncombustible materials (such as slate, marble, tile, etc.) must be at least 1/2" thick. With sheet metal, you must have noncombustible material behind it. Noncombustible material must extend at least 8" up (for all models). If noncombustible material is less than 12", you must install the fireplace hood accessory (24" and 30" Models Only). Even if noncombustible material is more than 12", you may need the hood accessory to deflect heat away from your mantel shelf. See Figure 5 and Figures 6 and 7, page 11, for minimum clearances.

IMPORTANT: If you cannot meet these minimum clearances, you must operate heater with chimney flue damper open. Go to Installing Damper Clamp Accessory for Vented Operation, page 12.

#### MANTEL CLEARANCES

In addition to meeting noncombustible material clearances, you must also meet required clearances between fireplace opening and mantel shelf. If you do not meet the clearances listed below, you will need a hood.

**Determining Minimum Mantel Clearance** If you meet minimum clearance between mantel shelf and top of fireplace opening, a hood is not required (see Figure 6).

# **Determining Minimum Mantel Clearance When Using a Hood**

If minimum clearances in Figure 6, are not met, you must have a hood. When using a hood there are still certain minimum mantel clearances required. Follow minimum clearances shown in Figure 7, when using hood.

NOTICE: Surface temperatures of adjacent walls and mantels become hot during operation. Walls and mantels above the firebox may become hot to the touch. If installed properly, these temperatures meet the requirement of the national product standard. Follow all minimum clearances shown in this manual.

NOTICE: If your installation does not meet the minimum clearances shown, you must do one of the following:

- operate the logs only with the flue damper open
- raise the mantel to an acceptable height
- remove the mantel

### FLOOR CLEARANCES




Figure 8 - Minimum Fireplace Clearances

- A. If installing appliance on the floor level, you must maintain the minimum distance of 14" to combustibles (see Figure 8).




Figure 9 - Minimum Fireplace Clearances

- B. If combustible materials are less than 14" to the fireplace, you must install appliance at least 5" above the combustible flooring (see Figure 9).

If Installed at Floor Level

### INSTALLING DAMPER CLAMP ACCESSORY FOR VENTED OPERATION

Note: When used as a vented heater, appliance must be installed only in a solid-fuel burning fireplace with a working flue and constructed of noncombustible material.

For Massachusetts Residents Only: Installation of this gas log set as a vented appliance in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts requires the damper be permanently removed or welded in the fully open position.

If your heater is a manually-controlled model, you may use this heater as a vented product. There are three reasons for operating your heater in the vented mode.

- The fireplace does not meet the clearance to combustibles requirements for ventfree operation.
- State or local codes do not permit ventfree operation.
- 3. You prefer vented operation.




Figure 10 - Attaching Damper Clamp

If reasons number 1 or 2 above apply to you, you must permanently open chimney flue damper. You must install the damper clamp accessory (to order, see <u>Accessories</u>, page 37). This will insure vented operation (see Figure 10). The damper clamp will keep damper open. Installation instructions are included with clamp accessory.

See chart below for minimum permanent flue opening you must provide. Attach damper clamp so the minimum permanent flue opening will be maintained at all times.

# INSTALLING HEATER BASE ASSEMBLY

WARNING: You must secure this heater to fireplace floor. If not, heater will move when you adjust controls. Moving heater may cause a gas leak.

WARNING: If installing in a sunken fireplace, special care is needed. You must raise the fireplace floor to allow access to heater control panel. This will insure adequate air flow and guard against sooting and controls being damaged. Raise fireplace floor with noncombustible material. Make sure material is secure.

A CAUTION: Do not pick up heater base assembly by burners. This could damage heater. Only handle base assembly by grates.

*IMPORTANT:* Make sure the heater burners are level.

#### Continued

#### Installation Items Needed

- hardware package (provided with heater)
- approved flexible gas hose and fittings (not provided) (if allowed by local codes)
- sealant (resistant to propane/LP gas, not provided)
- electric drill with 3/16" masonry drill bit Note: Install optional HRC Series receiver and hand-held remote control kit (see <u>Accessories</u>, page 37) before installing gas log heater. See installation instructions included

with the kit.
Apply pipe joint sealant lightly to male threads of the 1/2 NPT side of gas fitting elbow (provided) and connect to inlet side of gas control. Remove gas fitting from flexible gas hose (provided) before




Figure 11 - Attaching Flexible Gas Hose to Heater Gas Regulator

- connecting to elbow (see Figure 11).Position heater base assembly in fireplace.




Figure 12 - Attaching Base to Fireplace Floor

- Mark screw locations through holes in front panel of base (see Figure 12). If installing in a brick-bottom fireplace, mark screw locations in mortar joint of bricks.
- 4. Remove heater base from fireplace.5. Drill holes at marked locations using 3/16"
- Drill holes at marked locations using 3/16' drill bit.
- Attach base, through holes in front panel of base, to fireplace floor using masonry screws provided in hardware package (see Figure 12).
- Connect to gas supply. See <u>Connecting</u> <u>To Gas Supply</u>.

### CONNECTING TO GAS SUPPLY

WARNING: This appliance requires a 1/2" NPT (National Pipe Thread) inlet connection to the pressure regulator.

WARNING: A qualified service person must connect heater to gas supply. Follow all local codes.

CAUTION: Never connect propane/LP fireplace directly to the propane/LP supply. This heater requires an external regulator (not supplied). Install the external regulator between the heater and propane/LP supply.

WARNING: Never connect natural gas fireplace to private (non-utility) gas wells. This gas is commonly known as wellhead gas.

#### Continued

#### Installation Items Needed

Before installing heater, make sure you have the items listed below.

- external regulator (supplied by installer)
- piping (check local codes)
- sealant (resistant to propane/LP gas)
- · equipment shutoff valve \*
- test gauge connection \*
- sediment trap
- · tee joint
- pipe wrench
- approved flexible gas line with gas connector (if allowed by local codes) (not provided)
- \* A CSA design-certified equipment shutoff valve with 1/8" NPT tap is an acceptable alternative to test gauge connection. Purchase the optional CSA design-certified equipment shutoff valve from your dealer. See <u>Accessories</u>, page 37.




Figure 13 - External Regulator With Vent

For propane/LP units, the installer must supply an external regulator. The external regulator will reduce incoming gas pressure. You must reduce incoming gas pressure to between 11" and 14" of water. If you do not reduce incoming gas pressure, heater regulator damage could occur. Install external regulator with the vent pointing down as shown in Figure 13. Pointing the vent down protects it from freezing rain or sleet.

A CAUTION: Use only new, black iron or steel pipe. Internally-tinned copper tubing may be used in certain areas. Check your local codes. Use pipe of 1/2" diameter or greater to allow proper gas volume to heater. If pipe is too small, undue loss of volume will occur.




Figure 14 - Gas Connection (Remote-Ready Models Only)

Installation must include an equipment shutoff valve, union and plugged 1/8" NPT tap. Locate NPT tap within reach for test gauge hook up. NPT tap must be upstream from heater (see Figure 14).

*IMPORTANT:* Install equipment shutoff valve in an accessible location. The equipment shutoff valve is for turning on or shutting off the gas to the appliance.

Check your building codes for any special requirements for locating equipment shutoff valve to fireplaces.

Apply pipe joint sealant lightly to male NPT threads. This will prevent excess sealant from going into pipe. Excess sealant in pipe could result in clogged heater valves.

WARNING: Use pipe joint sealant that is resistant to liquid petroleum (LP) gas.

Pointing Down

#### Continued

We recommend that you install a sediment trap in supply line as shown in Figure 14, page 14. Locate sediment trap where it is within reach for cleaning. Install in piping system between fuel supply and heater. Locate sediment trap where trapped matter is not likely to freeze. A sediment trap traps moisture and contaminants. This keeps them from going into heater controls. If sediment trap is not installed or is installed wrong, heater may not run properly.

A CAUTION: Avoid damage to gas control. Hold gas control with wrench when connecting it to gas piping and/or fittings.

### **CHECKING GAS CONNECTIONS**

WARNING: Test all gas piping and connections, internal and external to unit, for leaks after installing or servicing. Correct all leaks at once.

WARNING: Never use an open flame to check for a leak. Apply a noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. Bubbles forming show a leak. Correct all leaks at once.

CAUTION: Make sure external regulator has been installed between propane/LP supply and heater. See guidelines under <u>Connecting to Gas Supply</u>, page 13.

# PRESSURE TESTING GAS SUPPLY PIPING SYSTEM

# Test Pressures In Excess Of 1/2 PSIG (3.5 kPa)

- Disconnect appliance with its appliance main gas valve (control valve) and equipment shutoff valve from gas supply piping system. Pressures in excess of 1/2 psig will damage heater regulator.
- Cap off open end of gas pipe where equipment shutoff valve was connected.

- Pressurize supply piping system by either opening propane/LP supply tank valve for propane/LP gas or opening main gas valve located on or near gas meter for natural gas or using compressed air.
- Check all joints of gas supply piping system. Apply noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. Bubbles forming show a leak.
- Correct all leaks at once.
- Reconnect heater and equipment shutoff valve to gas supply. Check reconnected fittings for leaks.

# Test Pressures Equal To or Less Than 1/2 PSIG (3.5 kPa)




Figure 15 - Equipment Shutoff Valve

- Close equipment shutoff valve (see Figure 15).
- Pressurize supply piping system by either opening propane/LP supply tank valve for propane/LP gas or opening main gas valve located on or near gas meter for natural gas or using compressed air.




Figure 16 - Checking Gas Joints (Propane/LP Only)




Figure 17 - Checking Gas Joints (Natural Gas Only)

- Check all joints from gas meter to equipment shutoff valve for natural gas or propane/LP supply to equipment shutoff valve for propane/LP (see Figure 16 or Figure 17, page 16). Apply noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. Bubbles forming show a leak.
- 4. Correct all leaks at once.

## PRESSURE TESTING HEATER GAS CONNECTIONS

- 1. Open equipment shutoff valve (see Figure 15, page 15).
- Open main gas valve located on or near gas meter for natural gas or open propane/LP supply tank valve.
- 3. Make sure control knob of heater is in the OFF position.
- Check all joints from gas meter to equipment shutoff valve for natural gas or propane/LP supply to equipment shutoff valve for propane/LP (see Figure 16, page 16 or Figure 17). Apply noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. Bubbles forming show a leak
- 5. Correct all leaks at once.
- 6. Light heater (see *Operation*, page 22). Check all other internal joints for leaks.
- 7. Turn off heater (see <u>To Turn Off Gas to Appliance</u>, page 21.

### **INSTALLING SWITCH**

The AUTO/OFF/ON switch for this log set will need to be installed into the small single log accompanying this log set. This switch needs to be installed only if remote or wall switch is not being used.

- VCG and EC Models: Slip wires of switch assembly through hole in center of log (see Figure 18).
- VCG and EC Models: Snap switch assembly into place.




Figure 19 - Connecting Wires

- 3. Attach wires to control valve as shown in Figure 19.

# INSTALLING OPTIONAL REMOTE ACCESSORIES

### Installing Remote Receiver

Remote control accessories are available separately (see *Accessories*, page 37).

If unit is already installed in fireplace, continue with these instructions. If unit has not been installed in fireplace, go to step 6 and continue installation of remote accessory.

WARNING: Turn off heater and let cool before handling any part of heater. Make sure gas is turned of to unit.

- 2. Carefully remove logs and set aside.
- Locate mounting screws on sides of heater base assembly and remove screws. Set screws aside for reinstallation.
- 4. Disconnect gas line from heater base as shown in Figure 11, page 13.

WARNING: A qualified service person must connect and disconnect gas to heater. Follow all local codes.

5. Remove heater base from fireplace.

#### Continued




Figure 20 - Installing Remote Receiver

- Install receiver bracket to base with phillips screws provided in hardware kit as shown in Figure 20.




Figure 21 - Disconnecting Switch from Control Valve

- If installed, disconnect AUTO/OFF/ON switch wire from control valve at TPTH and TH locations (see Figure 21).
- Install remote receiver into receiver bracket using pads and push button clips provided with receiver (see Figure 20).
- Connect wires from hardware pack (with remote receiver bracket) to control valve at the TPTH and TH locations as shown in Figure 21. Connect other ends of these wires to remote receiver wires.
  - Note: Make sure excess wire does not interfere with burner or pilot.
- If heater was removed from fireplace before installation of remote accessory, see <u>Installing Heater Base Assembly</u> on page 12 to reinstall heater into fireplace. Test gas connection for leaks (see <u>Checking Gas Connections</u>, page 15).

Bracket

# Installing Batteries for Remote Receiver and Hand Held Remote Control

Two 9-volt alkaline batteries (not included) are required to operate this heater with the wireless hand-held remote control set. One battery must be installed in the receiver and one in the hand-held remote control unit.

Note: Only use alkaline batteries.

### Installing 9-Volt Battery in Receiver

- Locate back of receiver behind receiver bracket mounted on base assembly.




Figure 22 - Installing Battery in Hand-Held Remote Control Unit

- 2. Locate the battery clip mounted on the back of the receiver (see Figure 22).
- 3. Slide a 9-volt battery through the clip.
- 4. Attach the terminal wires to the battery.

# INSTALLING LOGS, EMBERS AND LAVA ROCK

WARNING: Failure to position the parts in accordance with these diagrams or failure to use only parts specifically approved with this heater may result in property damage or personal injury.

Continued

A CAUTION: After installation and periodically thereafter, check to ensure that no flame comes in contact with any log. With heater set to Hi, check to see if flames contact any log. If so, reposition logs according to log installation instructions in this manual. Flames contacting logs will create soot.

### VGC and EC Model Series

It is very important to install these logs exactly as instructed. Do not modify logs. Only use logs supplied with heater.




Figure 23 - Installing Log #1

- Place rear log (#1) on base assembly as shown in Figure 23. Log will fit over right end of burner and rest in middle of U-burner.




Figure 24 - Installing Log #2

- Place middle log (#2) in front of U-burner and against the edges of plate as shown in Figure 24.




Figure 25 - Installing Logs #3 and #4

- Place front left log (#3) onto pan burner between log #2 and grate. Back of log #3 should fit against front of log #2. Place front right log (#4) onto pan burner between log #2 and grate. Logs #3 and #4 have notched ends to fit over end of pan burner as shown in Figure 25. Back of log #4 should fit against front of log #2.




Figure 26 - Installing Logs #5 and #6

- Place right crossover log (#)5 as shown in Figure 26. Match round peg on top of rear log (#1) with round hole on bottom of right crossover log (#5) and square peg on top of middle log (#2) with square hole on bottom of crossover log (#5).

- 5. Place left crossover log (#6) onto rear log (#1) and middle log (#2). Match round peg on top of rear log (#1) with round hole on bottom of left crossover log (#6) and square peg on top of middle log (#2) with square hole on bottom of left crossover log (#6) as shown in Figure 26.




Figure 27 - Placement of Embers

- 6. Add embers to front flat burner. Gently remove embers from bag using gloves or tweezers. (This material is a skin irritant. Gloves or tweezers are recommended to prevent skin irritation). Separate pieces of ember material and place on surface of flat burner as shown in Figure 27 overlapping ember pieces 1/4". Apply four pieces to front ports and 2 pieces to back ports. Additional glowing effect can be achieved by fraying edges of ember material.

WARNING: Do not operate unit without ember material correctly in place as shown in Figure 27. Do NOT place ember material anywhere else on the unit. Use only ember material supplied with unit. Excessive or incorrectly placed ember material may produce carbon monoxide or soot.

WARNING: Do not use rock wool or any other ember material not supplied with this unit.




Figure 28 - Installing Log #7

 Match round hole on bottom of center crossover log (#7) with round peg on right crossover log (#5). Rest front of log #7 on grate as shown in Figure 28. Center crossover log (#7) must overlap grate and rest against grate finger. Log must NOT rest on burner.

8. Add lava rock and small decorative logs around base of heater if desired. DO NOT place rock or additional logs on front burner or on logs. Placing any material on unit other than ember material on front burner may result in production of carbon monoxide or soot. Use lava rock to hide wires from switch/log to control valve. Place switch/log so the switch is easy to access.

#### **VCC Model Series**

It is very important to install these logs exactly as instructed. Do not modify logs. Only use logs supplied with heater.




Figure 30 - Installing Log #1

- Place rear log (#1) on base assembly as shown in Figure 30. Log will fit over right end of burner and rest in middle of U-burner.




Figure 31 - Installing Logs #2 and #3

- Place left bottom log (#2) onto base assembly as shown in Figure 31. See detail in drawing for contour on bottom of log. Log will fit over metal brackets and flat onto base assembly
- 3. Place right bottom log (#3) onto pan burner as shown in Figure 31.




Figure 32 - Installing Log #4

- 4. Place front log (#4) on top of left and right bottom logs as shown in Figure 32.

- Notches in bottom of log #4 will fit over ribs in logs #2 and #3.




Figure 33 - Installing Log #5

- Place top left log (#5) onto rear log (#1) and front log (#3). Match round peg on bottom of top left log (#5) with round hole in front log (#3) and square hole in log #5 with square peg on log #1 (see Figure 33).




Figure 34 - Installing Logs #6 and #7

- Place top middle log (#6) onto rear log (#1) and front log (#3). Match square peg on bottom of log #6 with square hole on log #4 and round hole on log #6 with peg on log #1 (see Figure 34, page 21).
- Place top right log (#7) onto top middle log #6 and front log (#3) matching peg on bottom of top right log #7 with hole on top middle log #6 and hole in top right log #7 with peg on front log (#3) (see Figure 34, page 21).




Figure 35 - Installing Log #8

- 8. Place small front log (#8) into slot on right bottom log (#3) as shown in Figure 35.

Add embers to front flat burner. Gently remove embers from the bag using gloves or tweezers. (This material is a skin irritant. Gloves or tweezers are recommended to prevent skin irritation). Separate pieces of ember material and place on surface of flat burner as shown in Figure 27, page 19. Apply four pieces to the front ports and 2 pieces to the back ports. Additional glowing effect can be achieved by fraying edges of ember material.

WARNING: Do not operate unit without ember material correctly in place as shown in Figure 27, page 19. Do NOT place ember material anywhere else on unit. Use only ember material supplied with unit. Excessive or incorrectly placed ember material may produce carbon monoxide or soot.

WARNING: Do not use rock wool or any other ember material not supplied with this unit.

10. Add lava rock and small decorative logs around base of heater if desired. DO NOT place rock or additional logs on front burner or on logs. Placing any material on unit other than ember material on front burner may result in production of carbon monoxide or soot. Use lava rock to hide wires from switch/log to control valve. Place switch/log so the switch is easy to access.


Figure 36 - Correct VCC Log Placement



# FOR YOUR SAFETY READ BEFORE LIGHTING



# LIGHTING INSTRUCTIONS



- A. This appliance has a pilot which must be lighted by hand. When lighting the pilot, follow these instructions exactly.
- B. BEFORE LIGHTING smell all around the appliance area for gas. Be sure to smell next to the floor because some gas is heavier than air and will settle on the floor.

### WHAT TO DO IF YOU SMELL GAS

- Do not try to light any appliance.
- Do not touch any electric switch; do not use any phone in your building.
- Immediately call your gas supplier from a neighbor's phone. Follow the gas supplier's instructions.
- If you cannot reach your gas supplier, call the fire department.
- C. Use only your hand to push in or turn the gas control knob. Never use tools. If the knob will not push in or turn by hand, don't try to repair it, call a qualified service technician or gas supplier. Force or attempted repair may result in a fire or explosion.
- D. Do not use this appliance if any part has been under water. Immediately call a qualified service technician to inspect the appliance and to replace any part of the control system and any gas control which has been under water.

### **WARNING:**

- If fireplace has glass doors, never operate this heater with glass doors closed. If you operate heater with doors closed, heat buildup inside fireplace will cause glass to burst. Make sure there are no obstructions across openings of fireplace.
- You must operate this heater with a fireplace screen in place.
   Make sure fireplace screen is closed before running heater.

NOTICE: During initial operation of new heater, burning logs will give off a paper-burning smell. Orange flame will also be present. Open damper or window to vent smell. This will only last a few hours.


Note: Home owners generally prefer to operate their heater with the chimney damper closed. This will put all the heat into the room. However, there may be times you will desire the full flames of the HI heat setting but will find the heat output excessive. You can open the chimney damper (if you have one) fully or partially to release some of the heat.

# WARNING: Damper handle will be hot if heater has been running.

- STOP! Read the safety information, column 1.
- Make sure equipment shutoff valve is fully open.
- 3. Set switch to OFF position.
- Press in and turn control knob clockwise to the OFF position (see Figure 37, page 23).
- Wait five (5) minutes to clear out any gas.
   Then smell for gas, including near the floor. If you smell gas, STOP! Follow "B" in the safety information, column 1. If you don't smell gas, go to the next step.

#### Continued

- Press in and turn control knob counterclockwise to the PILOT position. Press in control knob for five (5) seconds (see Figure 37).
  - Note: You may be running this heater for the first time after hooking up to gas supply. If so, the control knob may need to be pressed in for 30 seconds or more. This will allow air to bleed from the gas system.
- With control knob pressed in, press and release ignitor button on left side of log set. This will light pilot. The pilot is attached to the front of U-shaped burner. If needed, keep pressing ignitor button until pilot lights.
  - Note: If pilot does not stay lit, contact a qualified service person or gas supplier for repairs. Until repairs are made, light pilot with match. To light pilot with match, see Manual Lighting Procedure, page 24.
- Keep control knob pressed in for 30 seconds after lighting pilot. After 30 seconds, release control knob.
  - If control knob does not pop out when released, contact a qualified service person or gas supplier for repairs.
  - Note: If pilot goes out, repeat steps 4 through 8 beginning on page 22.
- Slightly push in and turn control knob counterclockwise to the ON position. If using a hand-held remote control accessory, go to <u>Optional Hand-Held Remote</u> Operation on page 24.

- 10. Wait one minute and put switch in ON position to light burners.
  - Note: AUTO is only functional when using GWMT1 or GWMS2 optional accessories. If hand-held remote control is installed but not being used, slide remote selector switch to ON (It must be in this position for burners to light. Switch will be in REMOTE position if using hand-held remote).
- 11. Set flame adjustment knob to any level between HI and LO.
- 12. To leave pilot lit an shut off burners only: turn control knob clockwise to the PILOT position, or use remote control manual OFF button, or set selector switch in the OFF position.

A CAUTION: Do not try to adjust heating levels by using the equipment shutoff valve.

WARNING: Make sure the remote selector switch is in the OFF position when you are away from home for long periods of time. Heater will come on automatically with selector switch in the ON position.




Figure 38 - Pilot (Propane/LP)




Figure 39 - Pilot (Natural)




- 1 Turn control knob clockwise / ★ to the OFF position.
- 2a. Set switch in the OFF position.
- 2b. If Using Optional Hand-Held Remote: Set selector switch in the OFF position to prevent draining battery.
- 3. Close equipment shutoff valve (see Figure 15, page 15).





- 1. Follow steps 1 through 6 under Lighting Instructions, page 22.
- 2. Depress control knob and light pilot with match.
- 3. Keep control knob pressed in for 30 seconds after lighting pilot. After 30 seconds, release control knob. Now follow steps 9 through 11, Lighting Instructions, page 22.





NOTICE: You must light the pilot before using the hand-held remote control unit. See Lighting Instructions on page 22.




Figure 40 - Control Knob, Ignitor Button and Remote Selector Switch

After lighting, let pilot flame burn for about one minute. Turn control knob to ON position. Adjust flame adjustment knob anywhere between HI and LO. Slide the selector switch to the REMOTE position (see Figure 40).

Note: The burner may light if hand-held remote was on when selector switch was last turned off. You can now turn the burner on and off with the hand-held remote control unit

IMPORTANT: Do not leave the selector switch in the REMOTE or ON position when the pilot is not lit. This will drain the battery.

### ON/OFF SERIES (MODEL HRC100)




Figure 41 - On/Off Hand-Held Remote Control Unit

Hold the control button on the hand-held remote until burner turns on. Hold the control button again until burner turns off (see Figure 41).

TO LOCK press both buttons on hand-held remote control until light stops flashing. Handheld remote control is now locked. If the fire is on it will be turned off automatically. In the locked state, the light will not light up when any button is pressed.

TO UNLOCK press both buttons together on hand-held remote control until the light stops flashing. The hand-held remote is now unlocked.

### THERMOSTAT SERIES (MODEL HRC200)




Figure 42 - Thermostat Hand-Held Remote Control Unit

The hand-held remote can be operated using either the manual mode (MANU) or thermostatic mode (AUTO) (see Figure 42, page 25). To select Fahrenheit/Centigrade mode display, carefully press the °C/°F mode button with the end of a paper clip or similar blunt object.

#### Continued

#### Manual Mode

- Press the POWER and LOCK buttons together to turn on the hand-held remote control
- 2. Press MANU button to turn on the fireplace.
- 3. Press the POWER and LOCK buttons together to turn off the fireplace.

### Auto (Thermostatic) Mode

- Press the POWER and LOCK buttons together to turn on the hand-held remote control.
- 2. Press AUTO button to select this mode.
- 3. Set the desired room temperature by pressing the TEMP + or buttons.
- 4. Press the POWER and LOCK buttons together to turn off the fireplace

Note: Do not leave the hand-held remote in the AUTO mode close to the fireplace. The radiant heat from the fireplace will turn off the fireplace. Ideally, place the hand-held remote in the center of the room facing towards the fireplace.

Note: Do not hold the hand-held remote for a long time. Body temperature will affect its operation in the AUTO mode.

### Safety Features

When away from home for an extended period of time or as a child safety feature to prevent accidental ignition of the fireplace, the receiver ON/OFF/REMOTE switch should be in the OFF position.

#### **Auto Shutoff Feature**

- If the average room temperature reaches a range of 82° F (28° C) to 92° F (33° C), hand-held remote control will perform a safety override and shut fireplace off. This feature is not available in MANU mode.
- The receiver continuously receives signals from the hand-held remote to control
  the room temperature. If the hand-held
  remote is misplaced, obstructed or for any
  reason cannot transmit to the receiver, the
  receiver will shut off the fireplace. This will
  occur in 8 or more minutes depending
  upon location of remote transmitter an
  strength of batteries.

#### **Key Pad Lock Feature**

This feature allows the user to lock/unlock the keypad on the hand-held remote in the MANU or AUTO mode to prevent inadvertent operation (i.e. children operating the hand-held remote control, etc.). The keypad is locked in either on or off. Press the POWER and LOCK buttons together to turn the unit on or off.

### INSPECTING BURNERS

Check pilot flame pattern and burner flame patterns often.


### PILOT FLAME PATTERN





Figure 44 - Incorrect Pilot Flame Pattern

Figure 43 shows a correct pilot flame pattern. Figure 44 shows an incorrect pilot flame pattern. The incorrect pilot flame is not touching the thermocouple. This will cause the thermocouple to cool. When the thermocouple cools, the heater will shut down.

If pilot flame pattern is incorrect, as shown in Figure 44

- turn heater off (see <u>To Turn Off Gas to Appliance</u>, page 24
- · see Troubleshooting, page 28

Note: The pilot flame on natural gas units will have a slight curve, but flame should be blue and have no vellow or orange color.

Figure 43 - Correct Pilot Flame Pattern

### **CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE**

A WARNING: Turn off heater and let cool before cleaning.

A CAUTION: You must keep control areas, burners and circulating air passageways of heater clean. Inspect these areas of heater before each use. Have heater inspected yearly by a qualified service person. Heater may need more frequent cleaning due to excessive lint from carpeting, pet hair, bedding material, etc.

WARNING: Failure to keep the primary air opening(s) of the burner(s) clean may result in sooting and property damage.

# BURNER INJECTOR HOLDER AND PILOT AIR INLET HOLE

The primary air inlet holes allow the proper amount of air to mix with the gas. This provides a clean burning flame. Keep these holes clear of dust, dirt, lint and pet hair. Clean these air inlet holes prior to each heating season. Blocked air holes will create soot. We recommend that you clean the unit every three months during operation and have heater inspected yearly by a qualified service person.

### **CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE**

#### Continued

We also recommend that you keep the burner tube and pilot assembly clean and free of dust and dirt. To clean these parts we recommend using compressed air no greater than 30 PSI. Your local computer store, hardware store or home center may carry compressed air in a can. You can use a vacuum cleaner in the blow position. If using compressed air in a can, please follow the directions on the can. If you don't follow directions on the can, you could damage the pilot assembly.

- 1. Shut off the unit, including the pilot. Allow the unit to cool for at least thirty minutes.




Figure 45 - Injector Holder On Outlet Burner Tube

- Inspect burner, pilot and primary air inlet holes on injector holder for dust and dirt (see Figure 45).
- 3. Blow air through the ports/slots and holes in the burner.
- Check the injector holder located at the end of the burner tube again. Remove any large particles of dust, dirt, lint or pet hair with a soft cloth or vacuum cleaner nozzle.
- 5. Blow air into the primary air holes on the injector holder.
- In case any large clumps of dust have now been pushed into the burner repeat steps 3 and 4




Figure 46 - Pilot Inlet Air Hole (Your pilot may vary from pilot shown)

Clean the pilot assembly also. Additional cleaning may be needed for proper pilot operation based on use/lack of use. A yellow tip on the pilot flame may indicate dust and dirt in the pilot assembly. There is a small pilot air inlet hole about two inches from where the pilot flame comes out of the pilot assembly (see Figure 46). With the unit off, lightly blow air through the air inlet hole. You may blow through a drinking straw if compressed air is not available.

### LOGS

- If you remove logs for cleaning, refer to Installing Logs Embers and Lava Rock, page 17, to properly replace logs.
- Replace log(s) if broken or chipped (dimesized or larger).

#### **MAIN BURNER**

Periodically inspect all burner flame holes with the heater running. All slotted burner flame holes should be open with flame present. All round burner flame holes should be open with a small blue flame present. Some burner flame holes may become blocked by debris or rust, with no flame present. If so, turn off heater and let cool. Remove blockage, blocked burner flame holes will create soot.

WARNING: The injector holders (air shutters) are not adjustable. Do not move the injector holders from their original positions.

WARNING: Turn off heater and let cool before servicing. Only a qualified service person should service and repair heater.

A CAUTION: Never use a wire, needle or similar object to clean ODS/pilot. This can damage ODS/pilot unit.
